The CCRB is dedicated to maximizing community resources to build and sustain a comprehensive system of services for children and families in St. Charles County. What's Happening at the CCRB?

Summer is here! Which means its the season for holidays, heat, and our funding applications.

At the CCRB, we have been busy strengthening our community relationships while keeping in mind our mission is to serve youth and families of St. Charles County. Here's a look at what we are working on and have accomplished in 2023 thus far.

- 2023-2025 Strategic Plan was approved at the May 22 meeting. The strategic plan focused on succession planning as the agency prepares for Bruce's retirement in July 2024 and revising the grant process. We look forward to putting the plan into action.
- Zengine application portal was introduced to agency partners and prospective
 applicants for the 2024-205 funding cycle. Concept papers for new and existing
 programs were submitted by May 15. Staff received 10 applications for new
 programs and all CCRB partners expressed their intent to re-apply for funding.
 Applications are due by 2:00 p.m. on August 15.
- The Center for Advanced Professional Studies (CAPS) invited Bruce and Michelle to present a request for proposal to the students on May 8 for ideas to

create a career path into the behavioral health and social work fields. Students presented their ideas at the end of the week. Follow-up will be completed in the fall.

The CCRB received 54 applications for additional ARPA funds, for a total of \$2.6 million requested. Subcommittees met and made their recommendations and in May, the Board approved the distribution of \$1.1 million, which expends the full amount of ARPA funds granted to the CCRB. The awards will fund capital projects to improve service delivery and salary increases to retain qualified agency staff so they can continue to provide high-quality mental health-relatd services.

Through prevention education and academic support, Boys & Girls Clubs of St. Charles County staff are working to combat the rise in adolescent suicides, drug abuse, and economic instability. The success of these efforts rests largely on our ability to retain quality staff who develop lasting relationships of trust with our Club members. The CCRB's commitment to funding our programs allowed our Board of Directors to make financial compensation a priority. A direct impact of this investment was the ability to create a staff position whose primary responsibility is to coordinate food, housing, and social-emotional support and resources for families, as well as directly support specific programs included in our program outcomes goals.

The growth in Club member retention is a positive sign of overall agency growth. The CCRB's involvement in and support of these events has contributed to successful partnerships with other youth serving organizations and provided access to more resources for our families. Youth in Need provided trained and licensed therapists to serve our clients during our summer camp program. In September 2022 the Club partnered with the Francis Howell School District to serve 40 students who benefited from our services.

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Dangerous Internet Challenges — Understanding Their Appeal to Kids Teens on the

Internet

Internet challenges can be fascinating to teens, who can be both impulsive and drawn to behavior that gets attention – especially in social media.

Some social media challenges, like the ALS ice bucket challenge or the mannequin challenge, can be fun and positive activities. But other challenges that pop up on the internet are dangerous and can lead to permanent harm.

You may have heard of social media trends like the Tide pod challenge, the choking game or "blackout" challenge, the cinnamon challenge or the salt and ice challenge. Then there's the Benadryl challenge and another that involves cooking chicken in NyQuil (the Sleepy Chicken challenge), which prompted the U.S. Food & Drug Administration to warn against the dangers of medicine misuse.



Study Shows Benefits of Creativity for Youth Mental Health

Young people who engage in creative activities report a reduction in feelings of stress or anxiety, according to a new study. The Adobe Foundation and National Alliance on Mental Illness, or NAMI, found more than 60% of young people surveyed reported an improved sense of confidence through painting, writing or any form of creative expression.

Fredric Miggins, NAMI senior manager, Field, Allies & Professionals, said improving access to creative activities could help turn the tide on a youth mental health crisis.

"Creative expression is something that just about anyone can engage in - in-person or online," he explained. "This makes it one of the most accessible ways for people to invest in supporting their own mental well-being."

While the event is free, District families are encouraged to bring a non-perishable food item to donate to Operation Food Search, which serves local families in need.






Meals must be eaten in the Library, and the child receiving the meal must be present.
